

New Dinosaur Found in Missouri

Like most of the eastern half of the US, Missouri isn't known for it's dinosaur fossils. The reason for this is during the Cretaceous, the US was split in two by the Western Interior Seaway. In the western half, called Laramidia, the Rocky Mountains were rising, creating a lot of sediment that washed down into huge alluvial plains. These sediments deposits were ideal for fossil formation. Dead dinosaurs would wash downstream and become buried in the sediments, their bones fossilizing. Today, the western portion of the US is eroding, and the fossils are naturally eroding from the ground. The eastern half, called Appalachia, the Appalachians had already risen and were in the process of eroding. This meant there was no sediment for fossils to form in.



In 1942, the first ever dinosaur bones were discovered in <u>Bollinger County</u>, <u>Missouri</u> by members of the Chronister family who were digging a well on their property. They set the bones aside because they were "unusual looking." Geologist Dan. R. Stewart heard about the find and the Missouri Geological Survey and Water Resources department sent him to investigate. He convinced Lula Chronister to allow Stewart to take them so they could be examined by paleontologists and later to sell the 12 vertebrae and some bone fragments to the US National Museum (now the Smithsonian Institution). With Dr. C.W.

Gilmore of the US Geological Survey, they published a paper in 1945 announcing the discovery of a new sauropod from the Upper Cretaceous named *Neosaurus missouriensis*. Neosaurus ended up being taken by another type of dinosaur, so they changed it to *Parrosaurus missouriensis*.

In the 1970s, Bruce Stinchcomb, a student at Rolla, was studying Stewart and Gilmore's research. He bought the site from Lula's son Ole and started excavation work. He discovered other parts of P. missouriensis, including dental remains and part of a jaw, along with teeth belonging to a cousin of the *Tyrannosaurus rex*, and bone fragments of a dromaeosaur. The dental fragments indicated that *P. missoriensis* could not possibly be a sauropod and was instead a type of hadrosaur (duck-billed dinosaur) and renamed *Hysibema missouriensis*.

In 2004, the State of Missouri named it the State Dinosaur.

Revised Statutes of Missouri (RSMo)

§10.095. State dinosaur. – The *Hypsibema missouriensis* dinosaur is hereby selected for, and shall be known as, the official dinosaur of the state of Missouri. (L. 2004 H.B. 1209)

In 2011, Guy Darrough discovered remains of a juvenile *H. missouriensis* at an undisclosed location near the original dig site. In 2016 and 2017, four more specimens were discovered at the same site. These were excavated by him and staff from the Field Museum of Natural History. The adults are at the Field Museum. The juvenile is at the Sainte Genevieve Museum Learning Center in <u>Ste. Genevieve</u> where Darrough works as curator.

In 2018, Chase Brownstein reverted *H. missouriensis* back to *Parrosaurus missouriensis* saying, "This dinosaur [*missouriensis*] is likely assignable to its own genus, Parrosaurus, as it is not only separated from the localities where the material assigned to *H. crassicausa* was found but also is now known from more materials, which may allow for detailed description (e.g., Darrough et al., 2005). Therefore, the name *Parrosaurus missouriensis* is preferred herein." Basically, it was different enough from the existing *Hypsibema* species that it should have its own genus.

On November 22, 2021, Darrough announced they found and excavated an adult *P. missouriensis* from the original Chronister site that would have been 35 feet long and weighed 2,000 pounds. For comparison, an adult *Tyrannosarus rex* would have been about 40 feet long and the new *Supersaurus*, announced in November 2021, would have been more than 128 feet long.
