INDIANA STATE DIRECTOR MICHELE YAMANAKA

We had our Fall Indiana clubs President/ Representative Zoom and email meeting on Aug. 3.

The Michiana Gem & Mineral Society reported: We are getting ready for our annual show at the St. Joseph County Fairgrounds. We have had two field trips this year: One to the agate beds in South Dakota, and the other collecting geodes in the Harrodsburg area of Indiana. Next year we are spending a week in central Wyoming rock hunting with members of the Riverton Wyoming Rock Club. We are also setting up a bus trip to Franklin, North in the spring. We have reinstated our scholarship program working with professors from the University of Notre Dame. We will be awarding two \$2,000 scholarships. Along with that we will have a mini-field trip to an 1863 farm. A geology professor from Notre Dame will be demonstrating the use of ground penetrating radar and what information they garner from the data collected.

The Michiana club also pointed out <u>a needed</u> addition to the New President's booklet. Under the section on financial requirements, add, after the short blurb about getting to be a 501(c): Ensure that the club files a 990 form every year with the IRS to maintain the club's tax-exempt status. Failure to file for three years will cause the club to lose its non-profit status. Ensure that the club files a Business Entity as often as required with the Secretary of State. Otherwise, the

Because the convention is so early, please **scan** your entries and forms, and email them to me by **January 10, 2025**. The top entries in each category of our MWF contest will be sent on to the AFMS contest; since the AFMS contest wants hard copies, I will print copies of the MWF winners and send them on to national. A little geography lesson: Lincoln is the capital city of Nebraska. It is the state's second most populous city and one of the top 100 largest cities in the Unites States. Originally, the area was salt marshes and arroyos – steep-sided gullies formed by fast-flowing water in an arid or semi-arid area. The area was settled in 1856 and called the village of Lancaster, but was renamed to honor President Abraham Lincoln, and became the state capital in 1869. In 1869, the University of Nebraska at Lincoln was also founded.

The first settlers to the area were attracted by the abundance of salt. Salt was a huge commodity. Today, Lincoln is home to Capitol Beach Lake – also known as Salt Lake. The lake is private with no public beach access, but the Saline Wetland Park is located at the east end of Capitol Beach Lake and provides a glimpse of restored and preserved rare land and a historic bowstring bridge. Access is free! I hope to see you there!

CLUBS THAT RENEW ON TIME GET TWO GREAT BENEFITS

The 2025 Midwest Federation forms for renewing club memberships are on the following two pages of this issue of MWF News. Please alert club officers to collect information for the forms.

One important piece of information needed is the total number of individual adult and youth members during the year <u>completed</u> during 2024. These figures are used for dues and insurance calculations. The rationale is that your total membership, by the end of the year, is usually about the same, so you always pay the current year dues based on your past experience. The treasurer needs this information **before January 15th** so our insurance can be activated on time.

The Midwest Federation will only publish each club's public contact information. Please make sure that the mailing address is checked at least weekly and the phone number connects to a real person who can answer questions about your club. We still need direct contact information that will be distributed on a need-to-know basis to Federation leaders.

Clubs are encouraged to provide name, position and email address for additional officers, board members and members who would like to receive the *MWF News*. This information will only be distributed to our editor and secretary. This is a great way to make sure that all of your officers are "in the know."

Clubs who renew on time will receive an email subscription to the juniors publication Mini Miners Monthly, distributed only via email. If you wish to have the Mini Miners Monthly subscription sent to someone other than your (1) junior program coordinator or your editor, please provide a name, position and email address for that person and indicate that he or she is to receive the Mini Miners materials.

Use the EVENTS form to submit details of shows and events during the coming year and the first four months of 2026. If the Events form is submitted with the dues, we will make sure it gets to the website, newsletter and directory coordinators. If it is submitted later, or separately, it is more likely to get overlooked.

Insurance will stay the same for 2025. Our current rate is \$4.50 per club member, and all members must be covered. Clubs that submit their dues on time (postmarked no later than January 15, 2025), may take a discount of 25ϕ per member.

Remember: The Federation insurance policy will cover groups of clubs jointly sponsoring shows or events **only if** all of the sponsoring clubs are current federation members and all of the sponsoring clubs purchase federation insurance. Requests for insurance for these jointly sponsored events must include a list of all sponsoring clubs.

club will no longer be recognized as a valid organization in its state.

The 500 Earth Sciences Club reported: Their show will be in Greenfield. They have expanded to three buildings, one pavilion, and outside vendors. They are adding a display area with a featured display and are encouraging vendors and club members to do a display too. (Have not had displays for some years.) They do school presentations but have not been successful in attracting juniors yet. They are looking for a way to set up their own lapidary workshop. They hope to set up a field trip after their show to which other Indiana clubs may join.

The 500 Earth Sciences members really enjoyed a new type of program that they learned about from another Indiana club newsletter. They purchased buckets of material from North Carolina, had a talk on North Carolina geology, and sent members home with some of the material to sort through on their own (because it would be too dirty to do at the library in which they meet). At the next meeting, members brought in the great specimens they found in their portion of the buckets.

We are still working on getting our other clubs to join our Indiana State club meetings.

MINNESOTA STATE DIRECTOR MARCIA OPATZ

The Anoka County Gem & Mineral Club now hosts TWO successful rock shows each year. The club added a new annual April rock show, while it continues to host its annual October show. Board planning, club volunteers, and a strong publicity campaign worked together to accomplish the goal of adding a second rock show. The club also had a successful annual May live & silent auction.

The Carlton County Gem & Mineral Club in Cloquet had a successful show again in mid-July, despite the heat (again). They are struggling, however, with membership, and therefore had trouble providing enough volunteers at the show, and really didn't have security.

Membership of the Cuyuna Rock, Gem & Mineral Society in Brainerd has been growing steadily

over the past year, with just over 200 members. The club hosted another successful show in the spring, with approximately 3,500 in attendance. There were 42 inside vendors and 29 outside. A member who took on the job of looking for locations to search for Lake Superior agates was quite successful, securing one owner with numerous farms. The club will also have field trips to the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and east central Missouri this fall. The club meets the second Saturday of the month, when machines are available for members to use, there is a rock store, and speakers share information on a variety of topics.

The New Ulm Gem & Mineral Club in Morgan has grown slightly in membership. In 2023 members went to Keokuk to look for geodes. The club meets September through May.

St. Croix Rockhounds is a small but enthusiastic club that meets in Stillwater, Minnesota, but draws members from Minnesota and Wisconsin – both sides of the St. Croix Valley. We have maybe 15 active members. We had a public show at Valley Creek Mall in Woodbury this past March and plan to have another show at the same location in late October.

In April we had an outing near Burkhardt, Wisconsin to look for agates, resulting in a couple of happy finds. In July several members of the club participated in a field trip to the Rapid City, South Dakota area, where we looked for prairie agates, rose quartz, and tourmaline. A few of us will be participating in another small trip to look for plume agate in western Texas in October.

Except in the summer, we meet on the third Tuesday of each month and enjoy a short educational program and a lively exchange of rock-collecting stories.

Another auction is scheduled for August. They took field trips to Magnet Cove, Arkansas, the Hemingway-Pfeiffer Museum in Piggot, Arkansas, and the Museum of the Red River in Ida Bell, Oklahoma. They have also had some interesting

programs at their meetings, including talks on ultraviolet light and fossil sharks and rays. A Christmas party is planned for December.


Mineral Area Gem & Mineral Society – No report received.

They are currently planning for their fall show that will be held October 26-27. This show is held at the Springfield Expo Center in Springfield, Missouri. LAPIDARY WORK SAFETY INVOLVES EQUIPMENT, CLOTHING, AND ORGANIZATION

Lapidary work, involving the cutting, grinding, and polishing of stones, requires meticulous attention to safety to prevent accidents and health hazards. Whether you are a hobbyist or a professional, adhering to safety protocols is crucial.

1. Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

N-95 Masks: Always wear an N-95 mask when working with lapidary machines to protect yourself from inhaling fine stone dust and oil mists. These particles can be harmful to your respiratory health over time.

Safety Glasses: Protect your eyes from flying debris and fragments by wearing safety glasses at all times. This is especially important when using grinders, saws, and polishers.

2. Appropriate Clothing

Avoid wearing loose clothing, jewelry, or accessories that could get caught in machinery. Opt for fitted clothing and secure long hair to prevent entanglement in moving parts.

3. Equipment Handling

Lapidary Grinders and Polishers: Ensure that all machines are properly maintained and in good working order. Check that guards are in place and functioning correctly. Always use the appropriate wheel or disc for the material you are working on, to avoid accidents.

Trim Saws: Before using a saw, inspect the blade for any damage or wear and replace it if necessary. Use a steady, controlled motion when feeding the stone into the blade, and never force the material through.

4. Workspace Environment

Keep your work area clean and organized to reduce the risk of accidents. Ensure that all tools and materials are stored properly when not in use.

Maintain proper ventilation to minimize the buildup of dust, fumes, and oil mists. Consider using an exhaust system or working near a window to improve air circulation.

By following these safety guidelines, you can minimize risks and ensure a more enjoyable lapidary work environment.
